Child-Centered Approach

We provide personalized educational care, ensuring each child receives tailored support through individualized intervention plans, diverse learning sessions, and dedicated evaluations.

Family-Centered Approach

We actively involve families in their child's development through coaching, guidance sessions, and collaborative meetings to foster consistent support at home and in the community.

Awareness of Specialized Education & Self-Protection

We engage parents and siblings in meaningful discussions and training sessions that enhance understanding of specialized education while promoting child protection, safety, and responsibility within the family.

Inclusive Educational & Human Experience

We create enriching opportunities by welcoming students, staff, and volunteers from diverse backgrounds, fostering inclusion and shared learning experiences for everyone.

School Inclusion

Launched in 2006 as a pioneering initiative in Lebanon, the School Inclusion Program, developed in partnership with the Ministry of Education and Higher Education (MEHE), continues to pave the way for inclusive education. This year, we supported 61 children with disabilities into the Jezzine Public School in South Lebanon.

Youth Achievements - South Program

Yes...They are ABLE

Neemtallah is a 17-year-old youth with a mild intellectual disability who is passionate about sports. His dream is to become a sports coach.

With the kind approval of the principal of Jezzine Primary School, we implemented an initiative allowing Neemtallah to design and lead sports sessions for preschool children. These sessions are pre-prepared in collaboration with our team and guided during the activities to ensure a positive and structured experience for both Neemtallah and the children.

Neemtallah has embraced this responsibility with enthusiasm. He feels proud of himself and of his ability to get the little ones moving and motivated. This experience gives him a sense of purpose and boosts his self-confidence.







Laura, 17 years old, shines through her love and care for young children.

As part of her developmental journey at SESOBEL Jezzine, Laura has taken on the role of assistant educator at a local daycare center, where she is present two hours a day from Tuesday to Thursday. This opportunity allows her to actively participate in community life and contribute meaningfully.

Her presence brings joy and warmth to the children, and she carries out her responsibilities with great commitment.

This initiative is also part of a broader strategy aimed at reinforcing the value of inclusive and community-based approaches.

Adult Programs

We are committed to providing quality support for adults with disabilities, honoring their age, dignity, and individual needs. Our adult programs offer a rich variety of recreational, expressive, and personalized activities both individual and group-based-designed to enhance their quality of life. These programs focus on promoting overall well-being through: daily activities, leisure activities, individual and group support, medical care & rehabilitation, social support, physical well-being and sensory-emotional communication, and parental guidance and follow-up.

The Protected Workshops

The protected workshops offer a safe and supportive work environment where 45 young adults engage in professional activities tailored to their abilities. These experiences help them build self-reliance and pave the way for stronger inclusion in society.









Center for Socialization & support

The Center for Specialized Support welcomed **16 youth and adults** aged 18 and above who live with severe motor or intellectual disabilities, as well as individuals on the autism spectrum with significant needs, excluding behavioral disorders.

Latest innovations in enhancing care & support for children



Detecting Pain in Non-Communicative Children with Disabilities

At SESOBEL, many children with severe disabilities struggle to express pain. To address this, specialized assessment tools were used to evaluate 42 children, including those with autism. The tools helped identify silent suffering, such as two cases of chronic pain from hypertonia and dystonia, which led to medical follow-up and postural care. SESOBEL aims to expand these assessments to ensure better care for all children unable to communicate their pain.



Application of the ACT Approach

At SESOBEL, psychologists applied Acceptance and Commitment Therapy (ACT), a cognitive-behavioral method promoting self-acceptance, to 18 children with neuromuscular diseases and cerebral palsy. Though long-term results are still pending, early signs show positive progress in emotional regulation and behavior, measured through a comparative evaluation grid.



Child Protection Curriculum

In partnership with Himaya, SESOBEL implemented a tailored program to raise awareness among children and parents about children's rights, abuse, and prevention. Integrated into educational and family activities, it fosters understanding of child protection and encourages open dialogue between children and adults.



MANTIS: A Protocol to Measure Communication Progress in Children with Autism

To assess communication development in children with autism, SESOBEL's R&D and Speech Therapy teams, in partnership with Systeminence, created the MANTIS protocol. It uses filmed observations of seven children attending two weekly TED (Exchange and Development Therapy) sessions, which are analyzed over time. MANTIS offers a structured, quantitative tool to track progress, with the potential to become SESOBEL's first internally developed tool and lead to a scientific publication.



Educational Curriculums on Solar Energy

SESOBEL created two solar energy curriculums—one academic and one sensorimotor—to suit diverse learning needs and promote renewable energy awareness. This initiative integrates environmental education into cognitive and functional programs, helping children engage with sustainability from an early age.



Educational Game

In partnership with Himaya, SESOBEL developed an interactive game to raise awareness about the 12 fundamental rights of children. This engaging tool educates children in a fun, accessible way, promoting understanding and meaningful discussions on child protection.

The Research elevate care, improve accessibility, and shape future practices

Early Detection of Infants at Risk of Cerebral Palsy

A survey of 90 professionals across Lebanon assessed practices and awareness on early detection of cerebral palsy in children under three. The findings, compiled into a scientific article for publication, lay the groundwork for early intervention programs targeting high-risk infants aged 0–3 months.

International Collaboration and Future Perspectives

SESOBEL partners with LAND, WDO, the Global LMIC CP Register, and Treat-NMD to align Lebanese registries (data collection) with other countries registries (global standards). Future efforts will expand the national network through collaborations with medical institutions, enhancing early detection, data collection, and care.

Evaluating Participation of Youth with Down Syndrome

In partnership with USEK, SESOBEL's social department is studying the participation levels of youth with Down syndrome who have received support for over ten years. The research assesses the long-term impact on social inclusion and daily life, with findings to be shared at international conferences to inform global best practices.

Arabic Translation and Validation of GMFR

SESOBEL, in partnership with CanChild, has launched a project to translate and validate the Gross Motor Function Family Report (GMFR) into Arabic, a key tool for assessing children's motor abilities at home. With ethical approval secured, translation is underway with USJ's School of Translation, and the Faculty of Medicine has funded the project with USD 480. This initiative will make the GMFR accessible to Arabic-speaking families of children with cerebral palsy.

SESOBEL: Towards a Green Community

With 236 solar panels installed, SESOBEL completed a major energy autonomy project to counter power shortages impacting its 1,400 children. Launched by La Guilde in partnership with Enerfip, L'Œuvre d'Orient, Fondation de France, and the Raoul Follereau Foundation, the project began just over a year ago.



The gallery of Rights

SESOBEL, in partnership with "Association Partage", marked the 35th anniversary of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child with an art exhibition highlighting children's views on rights and challenges. A roundtable with judges gave youth a platform to voice concerns about implementation in Lebanon. Visitors engaged with the artwork and testimonies, deepening their understanding and reinforcing SESOBEL's advocacy commitment.



Painting workshop for siblings

Bonds of friendship, vibrant colors, stories coming to life on canvas. The painting and crafts workshop at SESOBEL has always been a magical moment where our children freely express their creativity. This year, their brothers and sisters are also exploring the magic of this workshop, art as a language of the heart, a bridge for connection and well-being.



The Motor Activity Training Program (MATP)

Our sports coach, Joelle Ouba, joined the MATP Coaches Workshop in Kuwait with nine MENA The training focused on coaching countries. athletes with severe disabilities through personalized support, empowerment, and the Train-The-Trainer (TTT) model. Special thanks to Special **Olympics** Lebanon for this opportunity strengthen our coaching and athlete support.



Visual Clinic at SESOBEL

SESOBEL is one of the few centers in Lebanon offering specialized care for visual disorders in children with disabilities. Developed within the occupational therapy unit, structured evaluation protocols guide this work. This year, visual strategies were integrated into all educational programs and Individualized Intervention Plans. SESOBEL's multidisciplinary approach ensures each child receives the tools to reach their full potential.



International Wheelchair Day






Guides du Liban Association

Guided by this spirit, the girls focused on faithfulness to their values, their homeland, and their faith through a rich program of activities.















Rare Diseases Awareness Month

In March, SESOBEL marked Rare Diseases Awareness Month with two key events. A conference at LAU's Chagoury School of Medicine featured leading experts like Prof. Arnold Munnich and Dr. Isabelle Desguerre, Valérie Delague, Andoni Urtizberea, and Dr. Nady El Hajj. On March 6, SESOBEL hosted a special consultation day at DAR-SESOBEL Dora, where visiting specialists worked with the team to enhance care for children with disabilities.



Animal- assisted activity

Each week, our children and youth join sessions with therapy dogs Zinga and Freud through a program with the "On Guard" association. Designed for those with behavioral challenges, the initiative supports emotional, relational, cognitive, motor, and sensory development.



Drama Therapy at SESOBEL

SESOBEL introduced drama therapy in the Autism Unit to help children express emotions and build self-awareness through theater, dramatic play, and creative expression. This therapy helps them explore, understand, and resolve emotional and psychological challenges. In partnership with "For the Art", the program also includes siblings and parents, fostering emotional expression, family bonding, stress relief, and coping skills.



World Book Day

SESOBEL marked World Book Day on April 23 with "خط أحمر" by Samar Mahfouz Barraj, a story that highlights personal boundaries and self-respect. Through inclusive activities like art, role play, and sensory reading, children with disabilities and staff members' children shared a joyful learning experience that fostered connection and understanding.





Under One Sun, Life Blooms project

"Under One Sun, Life Blooms" is an inclusive collaborative project that aimed at fostering unity and awareness about solar protection and sustainability. The project brought together SESOBEL youth and EB9 students from a Lebanese School. Through a series of activities, meetings includina online and workshops, participants engaged in research, artistic creation, practical experiences, and dance, around solar all centered energy. This collaborative effort offered a platform for inspiration and learning on solar protection and energy sustainability.

My mom also says the government doesn't help much anymore. And people outside Lebanon don't send as many donations. I don't really understand all of that...



So we can keep feeling safe, and loved, and hopeful, no matter what.


Expenditure
